



Keep A Poem In Your Pocket By Beatrice Schenk de Regniers


Keep a poem in your pocket And a picture in your head And you'll never feel lonely At night when you're in bed.

Encourage reading across genres

Not only do good readers read often, they also read widely-they read many different kinds of things. Encourage your child to read a variety of materials, including:

- **Nonfiction texts**
 - about his hobbies and subjects that interest him.
- Instructions, how-to guides and recipes.
- Magazines and newspapers.
- Poetry collections.
- Biographies about influential people.
- Comics and graphic novels.
